What are the Autumn Dues Envelopes? The autumn due envelopes along with Christmas, Easter and Summer due envelopes pay the salary of the priest of the parish and contribute to the support of retired clergy, clergy working in offices and clergy in deprived areas. The current salary for a priest in the diocese is €1,400 per calendar month.


What is the Weekly Offertory Collection for then? It is a common misunderstanding that the weekly offertory collection is for the priest. In actually fact, the weekly offertory collection is for the running and upkeep of the parish – it does not form any part of the priest's income or salary. The priest salary is funded from the parish dues while any surplus contributes to support of other diocesan clergy.

If you have forgotten or not received an envelope; there are available at the church entrance. ## **PARISH NEWS**

**St. Joseph's Church – New Circulation Pump**: We are hoping to resolved the heating of the radiators – it was pointed out to me by two engineers and plumbers that while the boiler for the church was appropriate, the circulation pump was not. This has been now replaced and hopefully all the radiators now will be equally hot – I hope I can say now "Please be careful, the radiators in the church are hot to touch".

**Additional small changes:** People may have noticed some changes in the church already such as the candelabra, the gates at the front of the Church, the potted plants; the cleaned up church ware and the graves of the clergy buried on the church grounds. Any changes are made with the intention of prevention (rusting gates sandblasted and painted; church ware restored) and to enhance the church environment. Another issue that hopefully will be resolved in the next few weeks concerns the sacristy. There is a serious issue of smell of dampness in the sacristy and dampness around the north facing wall. This has been largely removed and the damp smell is reduced considerable. Also, work to make the sacristy more functional for people such as altar servers, cleaners, and for the general public will be completed in the next few weeks. The different concerns and possible solutions to resolving the issues of dampness and heating the church is a complex issue and will take thought, time, consultation and planning. While the new circulation pump and other small changes do not contribute to solving the major issues of dampness or heating the church by themselves; they are aimed to contribute by not allowing further deterioration of parish property and to enhance the church environment and comfort for people.

<u>Church of the Immaculate Conception</u>: The condition and state of the church is good; and does not need any immediate or urgent work. There is good insulation and a new roof in place. Small changes are been carried out such as new candelabra, potted plants and restoring church ware. It is hoped it will be possible to move the altar servers to the sacristy at the same time it occurs in Shrule.

**Glencorrib Radio Mass 101.4fm**: A radio broadcasting system has been installed at Glencorrib church. It is now possible to listen to scheduled Masses from Glencorrib Church on any standard radio tuned into 101.4 fm within a 3 mile radius. This service is provided for anyone homebound and unable to come to Mass. This coming week from 25<sup>th</sup> to the November 1<sup>st</sup> a religious CD will be played to help people tune their radios. If a family member is attending and would like to organize bringing the Eucharist to the person at home, please contact the parish. It is planned to have a similar system in Shrule church shortly.

**Conclusion:** I appreciate people bringing my attention to various things and possible solutions. The fact I have not done anything or responded is primarily the above among other things has keep me occupied. I am aware this update does not cover many things in the parish. I hope over time that it will be possible to cover them and keep you updated as issues and concerns are brought to my attention. If anyone has any questions or concerns, please make me aware of them and I will answer them as best I can.

## We Pray for Our Dead – Why do we pray for our dead?

"If one member suffers in the body of Christ which is the Church, all members suffer with that member." 1 Corinthians 12:26

Many Christian traditions recall and celebrate the role and impact of loved ones when they die, but the tradition of praying for the deceased is something that is not found in all Christian traditions. The Catholic and the Orthodox Churches are two of the Christian churches that pray for the dead. Praying for our dead is the primary purpose behind the tradition of the *Funeral Mass* that we have attend so many times in our own.

The origin of the Funeral Mass dates back to the 4<sup>th</sup> century and St. Augustine's mother, St. Monica. When she was dying she made a request of her sons, "Lay this body anywhere and do not let the care of it be a trouble to you... only this I ask: that you remember me at the Lord's altar, wherever you are".

The tradition of praying for our dead is based on Scripture, Doctrine and Tradition and practice of the Early Church. Within Scripture, in the Old Testament; prayers for the dead are mentioned in **2 Maccabees 12:43-45**. "When Judas and his men came to take away the bodies of their fallen brethren for burial, they found under the coats of the slain ...idols of Jamnia which the Commandments forbid... so betaking themselves to prayer, they besought God, that the sin which had been committed be forgotten... they offered sacrifice for the sins of the dead". In the New Testament, in **2 Timothy 1:16-18**, it reads as follows, "May the Lord show mercy to the household of Onesiphorus, because he often refreshed me and was not afraid of my chains. On the contrary, when he was in Rome, he searched hard for me until he found me. May the Lord grant that he will find mercy from the Lord on that day!"

Two Church Fathers who pray for the dead are – *Tertullian* d230 who mentions praying for the dead not as a concession to sentiment, but as a duty. *St. Augustine*, at the end of the ninth book of his *Confessions* prays for his deceased mother, Monica. The Doctrine of the Communion of Saints refers to the Catholic belief that those who have died while separated from us physically remain spiritually connected to us. **Death does not sever the bonds of communion since Christ conquered death with His Resurrection**. The Church holds that the **bond exists between the decease and living is a single reality through the communion of saints.** This belief is expressed for example in the Creed (Apostle's Creed – "the communion of saints") and the Eucharistic prayer (Eucharistic Prayer II – "remember our brothers and sisters who have fallen asleep in the hope of the resurrection, and all who have died in your mercy: welcome them into the light of your face") said at Masses.

Other Christian traditions don't pray for the dead as they hold that when a person dies, a person either had fully accepted or fully rejected God, and that belief alone saves a person. The Catholic Christian tradition hold that belief in God is expressed in faith and works, as in James 2:18, "But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works. Show me your faith without works and I will show you my faith by my works. A person may not have fully accepted God, as they like all humans have faults and weaknesses, yet at the same time, by examples of kindness and charity, they show love of neighbour. Our tradition holds it is possible to pray for those gone before us since **death does not destroy the bond** that exists between those alive and those who have gone before us (Luke 24:6, "he is not here, he is Risen"). The Church holds **we can assist those who have gone before us** similar to our supporting our fellow brothers and sisters in this world with prayer and acts of charity.

Purgatory is defined as the state of those who die in God's friendship, but are need of further growth so as to achieve the joy of heaven. Examples of prayer and charity in action vary from consoling the family to assisting the family in the funeral preparation to fasting in the month of November to partaking in various liturgies especially in the celebration of the Mass. When we pray for the dead, we ask God foremost to be merciful to them; to forgive them their sins, to welcome them into paradise and to comfort those in grief. Our belief is that Christ is not deaf to our prayers for our loved ones, as He was not deaf to the needs of people while He walked the earth as found in the Gospels.



### A WORD IN YOUR EAR with Fr. Dick Lyng. O.S.A.

The Rugby World Cup tournament is approaching its wonderful conclusion. Our dream may have died in the Millennium Stadium on Sunday last. But our interest is still alive and kicking! We were beaten fairly and squarely by a superior team. There was nothing unjust or unpalatable about our defeat. How different for Scotland! They were never given 'a snowball's chance in hell' of advancing beyond the first round in this competition.

They were reluctant recipients of the 'Wooden Spoon' in the Six Nations competition this year. Yet, they were leading the mighty Australia with a minute to go last Saturday.



In every sport-addicted sitting room and bar, the same conversation is afoot: 'The game's over for us. Why are you still watching?' The answer is, the chat, the banter. The 'Post Mortem' is half the fun. The chat often settles on blaming the referee. One pundit says, 'What we're looking for is consistency. Last week the ref didn't give a penalty; this time he did. We just need the same rules for everybody.' The other pundit says, 'Yes, what we need is common sense. Why follow the letter of the law? The ref should let the game flow and not blow the whistle all the time.'

What the pundits seldom realise is that they are expressing the two rival schools of ethics. One school is about right and wrong, about things being good or bad, regardless of circumstances. The other school is more nuanced; it's about outcomes – setting aside anxiety about right and wrong, and instead evaluating which course of action is likely to produce the most positive results.

What rugby, like many walks of life, is trying to do is introduce technology to ensure mistakes don't happen. So everyone on Sunday quickly agreed that the ref should have employed the technology to turn a borderline decision into a conclusive one. But it turns out the regulations state the technology can only be used in the case of try-scoring or foul play. So, to find the truth, the referee would have had to bend the rules himself!

A minute later, at the end of the game, the referee bolted off the field – as if in panic at what he'd done. However much moralists deliberate and pundits pronounce, we're all still fallible. Those who stayed watching for the 'Post Mortem' on Sunday last were rewarded with the extraordinary dignity of the Scots' coach and captain expressing sadness without blame.

Jesus was especially close to two of his followers: John seems to have had a special place in his heart. Meanwhile Peter was passionate but unreliable. Jesus chose to found the church on Peter – the one who made terrible mistakes, yet allowed those mistakes to be exposed and forgiven. No system of ethics, no code of rules or morality will stop us getting things wrong. No sophisticated technology can ultimately prevent us suffering the consequences of other people's mistakes. Life isn't about NOT making mistakes: it's about how we deal with them, as unwitting perpetrators, or as innocent victims.

Work for a cause, not for applause. Live life to express, not to impress. Don't strive to make your presence noticed just make your absence felt."

### **BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE EDEN PROGRAMME**

**Background information:** The Eden Programme was developed by a charity called Suicide or Survive (SOS). This organisation was set up in 2003 to "challenge the stigma attached to mental illness and provide a range of educational and therapeutic programmes that increase understanding of suicide and play an active role in its prevention in Ireland" (Suicide or Survive, 2012). The Eden Programme was first run in 2007 and since that time approx. 10 programmes have been delivered in the east coast of Ireland. SOS, working in partnership with the HSE, would now like to make the programme available to people living in Galway and Mayo.

**What is the Eden Programme?** The Eden Programme is a 26 week closed group programme which is educational in nature with a therapeutic element. It runs for 3 hours one day per week. It is for people who have attempted or contemplated suicide. It aims to provide participants with an opportunity to explore their own experiences, develop their personal skills and source avenues of support and assistance. The programme is based on experiential learning, group discussion and the approach used is participant-centred.

Who Delivers the Programme? SOS developed two manuals setting out the content of the programme and also how best to deliver it. They would now like to licence the programme to the Adult Counselling Service HSE who will run it as part of their service, within defined quality assurance standards. As part of the licensing agreement between SOS and the HSE, SOS will run a Training for Trainers programme for facilitators. These facilitators will then deliver the Eden Programme to participants locally in Galway and Mayo. The programme is co-facilitated and guest speakers are invited to also present on specific relevant topics. An appropriately qualified and experienced external supervisor will provide monthly group supervision sessions to the facilitators.

**Who can attend?** The target audience is adults (i.e. those 18 years of age or older, with no upper age limit) who have attempted or contemplated suicide. It is offered to those who are open to attending a group, with the motivation to change. The learning around safe ways in which to recruit suitable participants have been carefully identified and documented in SOS's training manuals.

**Funding costs:** The HSE National Office for Suicide Prevention and the HSE West Suicide Prevention Office are funding the delivery of this programme.

**Evaluation:** Dublin City University have published a fully independent evaluation of the programmes run by SOS on the east coast.
